Program Summary

The goal of the Elementary Education Teacher Licensure Program is to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to plan and implement developmentally appropriate learning experiences for children in kindergarten through grade six (K-6). Students who complete the undergraduate teacher licensure program in elementary education are prepared to enter the first phase of their professional career as effective beginning teachers. Upon completion of all program requirements and successful completion of a state-mandated licensure exam, a student is eligible for recommendation for teacher licensure in North Carolina. Recommendation for licensure in other states is subject to the laws and requirements of those states, and compliance with those regulations is the responsibility of the student.

Beyond the Classroom

Preparation for entering an elementary teaching career includes an integration of theoretical study into classroom practices, a variety of field experiences, and systematic reflection concerning one's professional and personal experiences and goals.
