Program Summary

Finance develops analytical reasoning through formal modeling, empirical testing, cash flow analyses, and historical-institutional interpretations. Finance majors gain training for strategic management and leadership; along with strong preparation for graduate study in Finance, Economics, Law, or MBA programs. The knowledge and skills developed are utilized in problem solving, executive decision-making, and policy applications in business, regulation, internal compliance, banking, investment, and not-for-profit organizations. Thus, the Finance major prepares students for interesting careers as well as for further graduate work. Oral and written communication is especially important in course work; together with mathematical, empirical, graphical, and datapresentation software and skills.

Beyond the Classroom

Graduates of Finance tend to work as financial analysts or managers in corporations, commercial banks, investment banks, insurance companies, brokerage firms, and pension funds. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports overall mean annual salary encompassing the range of entry-level and senior-level experience—for all Finance Managers to be almost \$150,000.
