## Program summary

Philosophy is the pursuit of wisdom by reasoning carefully about the answers to fundamental human questions such as: How should I live? How can I be happy? What is the most fundamental reality? What can be known? Is there a God? The Philosophy Major initiates you into the practice of philosophy, primarily by examining great works of philosophy. The Philosophy Minor strengthens your major by sharpening your thinking and by addressing philosophical questions at the root of every study or enterprise. The overall goal of the Philosophy program is to help you develop an integral and integrated understanding of your experience and studies, of your life as a whole, and of its place in the world. A fortunate byproduct is that you develop reasoning skills needed for success in intellectually demanding work such as medical research, law, journalism, and entrepreneurship.

## Beyond the Classroom

Many successful peopleincluding supreme court judges, founders of large companies, journalists, and medical researchers-claim that studying philosophy gave them the reasoning skills they needed to succeed. Philosophy majors also consistently score at the top on the GRE and LSAT, and near the top on the GMAT, indicating that philosophy is an excellent preparation for graduate study.
